



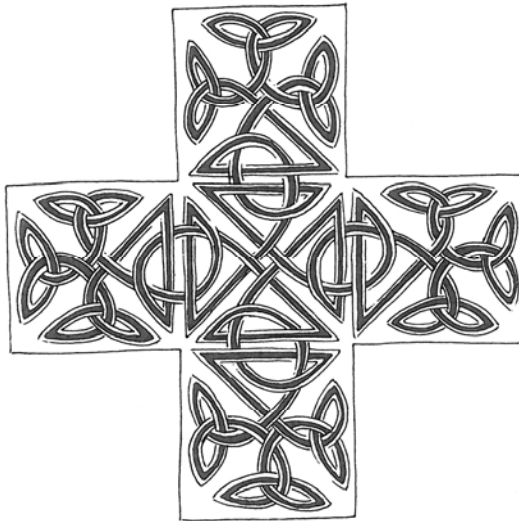

Once again St. Tim's has shown itself to be on the cutting edge. Health and health care are at the top of our national agenda and St. Tim's has jumped right into uncharted waters by partnering with us in our first ever health fair. So many parishioners gave of their time and talent to help facilitate this event and we want to give each of them a huge thank you. I am unsure of the exact number of students served, but feel that it must have been close to 100.

We have always known that an increased educational level increases quality of life and the same can be said for health literacy. Given the fact that 35% of all Missourians score at basic or below basic in health literacy and that low level literacy costs this country's economy \$106-238 billion a year, Missouri's economy \$3.3 billion-\$7.5 billion a year and the economy of St. Louis county \$883.4 million a year. (www.mffh.org/vernon.pdf), it is clear that more partnerships like ours would be a very good thing.

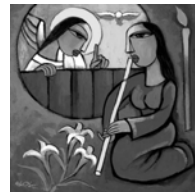
Our thanks to each and every parishioner at St. Tim's who supports our programming and special thanks to those who gave so generously of their time at the health fair. We are most grateful.

Rachel Kohn's Report on Her Mission Trip to Brazil, Part 2

(This is the second installment of Rachel's most wonderful story of her mission trip. The first installment ended with..."At the first service of the week I saw a tarantula on the ceiling. It was all good until I looked up and it wasn't in its place anymore..!.)

Hi Everybody!

The second week was a lot different from the first. We were on the Amazon River. Our boat this week was a closed-in boat with cabins that had air conditioning. I was glad that it was closed-in because there were some scary bugs on the river. One bug, called a *peebug*, secretes burning acid onto your skin if you touch it. Another bug that was like a wasp gives really painful bites! The Rio Negro actually didn't have many bugs- maybe because the water is black? Also, during the second week, except for the first day, everyone had to stay on the boats because the villages were flooded. It was like we had taken a trip to Venice. The villagers had to maneuver around in canoes because the flood waters were so high. One night, we had to

have a church service before dark, because the people were worried about alligators coming up to the church. We also had to modify vacation bible school so that it was held in our community room on the boat. One day we set up a fun table for the kids while their parents were visiting the clinics. There was nail polish, stickers, tattoos, face painting, bubbles, and more! A little girl had fun taking a lot of pictures with my camera! It was a nice change though for the kids because they got to enjoy air conditioning. On the last day, I woke up early to see the sunrise and it was b-e-a-utiful! I also saw numerous dolphins jumping in the water!

My trip to Brazil was an experience that I will never forget. I met truly fascinating people everywhere I went. There are countless things that I have learned too. I would love to visit again!
