# From the Rector



Dear People of St. Timothy's,

It seems that we have not had time to catch our breath since Christmas and the season of Lent is upon us. Lent means so many different things to each of us. For some of us it means "Fish Fry" opportunities that attend the season in St. Louis. For others it is a chance to start a diet, either for health or spirituality. The idea of Lent as a season of discipline goes back to its earliest practice.

The traditional disciplines of Lent find their origin in the gospel reading for Ash Wednesday. The Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 6 describes fasting for the good of the body, prayer for the good of the soul, and almsgiving for the good of the neighbor. The clear intent of Jesus is that our discipline is not something showy, but it is to be humble, sincere and personal. Any discipline we embrace should not be external, but deeply internal, seeking true repentance and amendment of life.

The hunger created by fasting is not for self-punishment, but to remind us to hunger for God. The discipline of prayer also bends the conscious mind to listen for God's guidance. Even almsgiving makes us aware that we may most readily see the face of God when we look in the face of our neighbor.

All our disciplines should direct us to the Great Commandment—deeper love for God and our neighbor. Mark Bozutti-Jones, Priest for Pastoral Care and Community at Trinity Wall Street, says, "Jesus says, 'Love one another, but to love one another, you must know one another.'" It is in relationship that faith is both tested and fulfilled. When we draw closer to each other we risk revealing our own flaws. It is relationship that we discover the heart of the gospel; the forgiveness of sins.

Lent requires that we examine our lives in the light of our promise of love toward God and neighbor. It is in seeking God and loving neighbor that we find his favor, not because of our own virtue, but because of the grace given in Jesus Christ.

## **LIVING APART: RACE, RESIDENCY, AND REALITY**

You may be surprised, even shocked, to learn how neighborhoods were formed in St. Louis and who decides who lives in them. Do you want to know how real estate practices affect education? Where does North St. Louis end and South St. Louis begin? And why?

You are invited to spend a few hours in a "safe place" engaging in friendly, honest and informative discussions about the influence of segregation on our lives. Listening and sharing will move the conversation forward.

The Commission on Dismantling Racism will also offer special commemorations honoring the late Rev. Emery Washington, longtime Episcopal clergyman and founder of the DRC; and the late Mr. Michael McDowell, longtime member of St. Timothy's, active member of the DRC and civic leader.

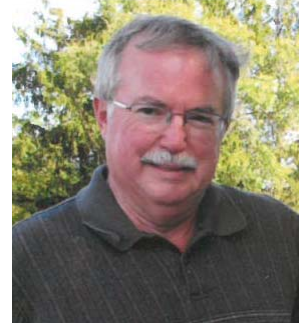
## Honoring Mike McDowell at Absalom Jones Event

On Saturday, February 6, 2016, St. Tim's will honor the memory of Mike McDowell as part of the Diocesan-wide celebration of Absalom Jones Day. McDowell led St. Timothy's Dismantling Racism Committee until his unexpected death in 2013.

Absalom Jones—former slave and abolitionist—and McDowell—a city manager—both believed in racial equality. In 1794, in Philadelphia, Jones established the first African American Episcopal Church. He later became the first black man ordained as an Episcopal priest. Jones believed in education, opportunity and service to the poor.

"Mike would be so honored to be remembered on Absalom Jones Day," says his widow Teresa. She notes that her husband grew up in Jackson, Tenn., in the 1950s and 1960s. White and black people were segregated in schools, churches, restaurants, theaters and even at the county fair.

"Mike saw the injustice and spoke up at home, in church and at school—even when people didn't like it. Righting injustice laid the groundwork for his life," she says. "Mike got involved in the Dismantling Racism Committee because it was his passion to live in a world where everyone was treated equally."



"As manager for Creve Coeur, Olivette, Wentzville and four other cities, Mike treated employees equally regardless of race and they were expected to do the same in their community," says Teresa. "We also raised our sons Brian, Jeff and Chase to judge people by their actions, not by skin color."

We invite everyone to participate in Absalom Jones Day at St. Tim's as the Diocese of Missouri commemorates McDowell's legacy.

## Sue Eastes: Celebrating a Milestone in Ministry

February 2016 marks an incredible 30 years of service for St. Tim's Clergy Associate the Reverend Sue Eastes. She was ordained as an Episcopal priest in February 1986, and we are so happy and honored to celebrate with her.

Eastes appreciates the significance of reaching the 30-year mark. It wasn't until the mid-1970s that women could even serve as priests in the Episcopal Church, she notes. "A woman, celebrating 30 years, is kind of rare," she says. "But as the years go by, it won't be. Now there are a lot of young women entering the priesthood and I'm tickled to death."

The priesthood is actually Eastes' second career. She first worked in Information Technology Management at General Mills in Minneapolis, Minnesota. She has savored

both of her professions. "I have no bucket list left," she says. "I've lived a life that I've loved. I have no regrets about accepting all that God offered."

Eastes currently leads the weekly Wednesday worship service and coordinates a Sunday morning Bible study. "I love the people of St. Tim's—each and every one," says Eastes. "I see them as hungry for the Spirit, for God, for the Word and hungry to find out how life can be lived with God."

St. Tim's Rector, the Reverend Marvin Foltz summarizes what we appreciate so much about Eastes: "Sue has devoted her life to God," he says. "She is a pioneer, she is committed, she is very bright, and she is a really special person."

**PLEASE NOTE: Eastes will preach at the 10:45 a.m. service on February 7. Be sure to attend and celebrate the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of her ordination. With her ministry, God has given us a great goodness and joy.**

## Sunday Bible Study Classes

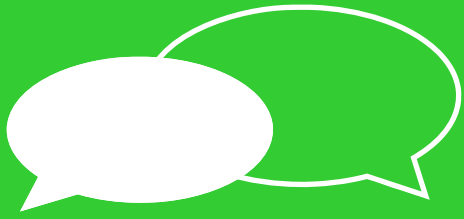

We finished 2016 with a \$55,319 surplus. On the revenue side, plate and pledges both exceeded our plan and our facility usage income from outside organizations was twice our expectation. On the expense side, our payroll was less than planned since we did not hire additional clergy and our insurance expense was \$5,000 less than planned. Thank you so much for your faithful support and commitment to all our wonderful ministries. The Finance Committee enjoyed presenting 2016's budget at the annual meeting.
