# From the Interim Rector



Dear Friends –

And so it is upon us. This year will be different; even more so than the seasons following 9/11 or the assassination of JFK. The crisis that the coronavirus has brought to bear is sorely testing us, and, as an added bonus, it has shone a light on the dark corners of our democracy. Political divisiveness, income disparity and racism have been exposed. Mask wearing has become a political weapon, for heaven's sake! People have been "unfriended" because of their differences! Where is God in all of this? What good is our faith? Where is hope?

The task of Advent is to prepare our hearts and minds for the Christ who has already come; the Christ who is present now; and the Christ who is promised to come. It is a time of quiet reflection and repentance; a time to prepare. One must wonder if the *vivissimo* of our frenetic consumerism and the secularization of the Nativity caused us to lose sight of that. We rhetorically ask ourselves where God is if we cannot spend thanksgiving with our families, if we cannot go caroling or attend Christmas parties. Indeed. Where is God? And that is the question of Advent.

God is right here, even in our anxiety, inviting us to return to a quieter, more reflective way. During Advent, we set aside a structured time to slow down and to reflect upon the movement of God in our lives. We set aside time to pray, to study God's Word, to worship and to do outreach and, in so doing, we prepare for the coming of the Lord. Pray. Study. Worship. Outreach. These

action words point us to God, even in the face of our heightened anxieties and resentments.

At St. Tim's, we offer many ways to prepare: For prayer, join us in a service of Evening Prayer Mondays thru Thursdays at 5:00 PM on Facebook live or make it your habit every night before bed to pray Compline. (Search for the link on our website.) Lay your anxieties and stress at the foot of the cross—or simply listen for that still, small voice. In study, we also prepare our hearts. Join the 7:00 AM Bible Study on Wednesdays where we consider the upcoming week's lectionary. Or join us for "Women of the Bible" on Wednesdays at 10:00 AM and again at noon. Or log in to the study offered for free through Yale University on Monday nights. And, still we worship: Sunday mornings at 10:45. We miss you as much as you miss being inside our sanctuary. And let us not forget Outreach. Check out our weekly email and learn how you can feed the poor with a contactless food collection in your very own neighborhoods.

Where is God? Right here with us, calling us to something new.

Prepare ye the way of the Lord!  
O come, O come Emmanuel.

## Advent Study: Women of the Bible


This eight-week study will focus on the incredible stories of women in the Bible.

# Everything You Always Wanted to Know about the St. Timothy's Vestry

## What is a vestry?

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines a vestry as *"an elective body in an Episcopal parish composed of the rector and a group of elected parishioners administering the temporal affairs of the parish."*

Historically, according to Wikipedia, *"a vestry was a committee for the local secular and ecclesiastical government for a parish in England and Wales, which originally met in the vestry or sacristy of the parish church, and consequently became known colloquially as the 'vestry.'"*

Joy Rouse, our current Senior Warden, wrote the following explanation of how the St. Timothy's Vestry works and how you can get involved:

The Vestry of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church is a 12-member board of parishioners elected by and representative of the parish to fill the lay role in church governance. Each January at the annual meeting, four members are elected to replace those whose 3-year terms are ending. A Senior Warden (this year Joy Rouse) is then appointed by the Rector, and the Junior Warden (now Steve Crock) is elected by the vestry.

The current Vestry began the year by creating three documents to be the foundation of our work: **Vestry Responsibilities** (a revised job description), **Vestry Norms** (how we do this job), and **Vestry Covenant** (how we seek to conduct ourselves as members of the St. Timothy's vestry and greater community).

Those documents, along with the **Qualifications and Terms for Vestry Membership**, are available at <https://www.saint-tims.org/vestry.html>

All are living documents and will be revised as times and circumstances change. I invite you to read especially this Covenant (provided on the next page) and join us in committing to it as a way of being an active member in the St. Timothy's family following the teachings of Jesus.

## How can you get involved?

As the calendar pages continue to turn, we are already approaching the beginning of a new year. At the Virtual Annual Meeting on January 24, 2021, we will thank four retiring vestry members and elect four new members to join the remaining eight in serving as the lay governing board of our church. But now it's "nominating season." Do you have a friend in the church who would be good in this role? Or how about you? Are you ready to have something new and important to do to fill your COVID gap time, and to fill your mind with new and important thoughts and prayers?

Please read the Vestry documents, think about them, and give me a call. Or call Mother Liz, or call the office and get the names and numbers of those on our nominating committee. Please be involved in recommending someone to join the current slate of excellent candidates or add your own name to the list of those willing to serve St. Timothy's in this very fulfilling way. Let's pray about it.

## St. Timothy's Vestry Covenant

Our behavior and relationships with one another and with the congregation will be governed as Christ taught us: to love God and to love our neighbors as ourselves. We acknowledge St. Paul's directive to Timothy (1 Timothy 4:12) concerning his role as church leader to be "an example to the believers in speech, life, love, faith, and purity." The Vestry members of St. Timothy's Church adopted the following Covenant on July 15, 2020.

### To love one another by:

- Creating and nurturing safety in the space of the vestry meeting for all to comfortably and confidently express their thoughts with no negative consequences, and, if necessary, extending forgiveness and love in the event of unintentional distress.
- Validating the different styles, personalities, viewpoints and backgrounds of individual vestry members, celebrating our diversity.

### To treat each vestry member with respect by:

- Speaking and acting to support one another, refraining from divisive or hurtful speech and assuming positive intent in all interactions.
- Remembering that our service is to God and God's church, which fosters a loving attitude.
- Inviting the participation of quieter voices so that everyone can be heard, knowing that each of us has our own particular sufferings and weaknesses, as well as strengths and talents.
- Agreeing to criticize ideas, not persons, and avoiding personal attacks as destructive to community and contrary to God's law of love.
- Insisting that people who have criticisms of another church leader express those in the presence of that individual.
- Confronting challenging issues from a place of honesty and kindness, without demeaning anyone, and by following Matthew 18:15-17 for conflict resolution: speaking first to the individual alone; if to no avail, bringing another vestry member into the conversation; and then, if necessary, referring the matter to the larger entire vestry.
- Asking for forgiveness when you know you have hurt someone; forgiving someone who has hurt you.
- Respecting confidentiality, and when in doubt, asking for clarity regarding what is confidential.

### To seek God's will by striving for unity in all matters through:

- Embracing spiritual practice as foundational to our work, using prayer to guide decision-making.
- Promoting the common good by upholding the final decision of the vestry even when I disagree.
- Maintaining rules and boundaries and not bypassing established lines of authority.

### To be an example to the congregation by:

- Being faithful to the mission and vision statement of Saint Timothy's Episcopal Church.
- Faithfully attending Sabbath worship and studying Holy Scripture.
- Giving sacrificially and making an annual pledge to support the ministry and mission of the church.
- Widening the circle of our relationships within the parish, by getting to know parishioners who are new to us.

## Reaching Out During a Pandemic

How do you Reach Out in the midst of a pandemic? That is the question the Reaching Out Ministry has been wrestling with for the past several months. The answer has been to re-examine our core values, embrace technology, and shift how we reach out to match the current need.

The Reaching Out Ministry has been on a journey to simplify and clarify our strategy to focus on those ministries and partnerships that are at our core. Specifically, our work of Feeding Our Local Community has been an enduring value at St. Tim's that has grown in its relevance in the midst of the pandemic. Rice Bagging, Trinity & Parkway Food Pantries, St. John's Peace Meal, Circle of Concern and our own St. Tim's Food Pantry Garden are all ministries that draw us closer to our neighbors who struggle daily for a consistent, nutritious meal. We also aspire to further leverage Episcopal service through our support of Episcopal City Mission and Deaconess Anne House.

Reaching Out also looks different this year as we embrace technology with Zoom meetings, virtual



ministries and inter-committee partnerships. For example, the annual Episcopal City Mission Angel Tree will be mostly virtual this year. We will share the needs through electronic and snail mail and then provide pictures of the presents as they arrive under that tree which can be viewed from the safety of your home. Similarly, St. Tim's long-time Mitten Tree

event lives on to provide clothing to those people who simply can't stay warm without our help. And speaking of staying warm, we continue our partnership with Sigel School this year through a winter coat donation where we endeavor to provide 200 coats to these resilient children.

One final innovation going forward is the Invite Welcome Connect plan to

hold a "Neighbors Feeding Neighbors" quarterly food drive. Parishioners will distribute food bags to their neighbors in a contactless food collection for all our neighbors in need. (See article on the last page for more details.) Like everything else in this pandemic, we have had to adapt to how we effectively Reach Out. Thanks to the St. Tim's community for all your new ideas and vigorous support as we do our best to meet the urgent needs of our neighbors.

## Ecumenical Partners offer Advent Message

November 30, 2020

Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop and Primate Michael Curry and the leaders of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), the Anglican Church of Canada and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada have joined together to offer the following Advent message:

### **“Churches Beyond Borders - Advent Call to Address Racism and White Supremacy.”**

*John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins (Mark 1:4).*

In the wilderness and in the river, on the margins of society, John the Baptizer offered faithful witness to the ongoing work of God. People went beyond the borders of their familiar lives to hear the words of a prophet, to seek renewed faith, to begin new journeys and to be transformed through baptism.

What does it mean to offer faithful witness today? As we ponder this question together as national church leaders, we experience shared challenges, new insights, mutual encouragement, deeper faith and common callings. Our common witness is bound not by ecclesiastical or national borders but by our common baptism. As leaders of four churches on a shared continent, and with shared complicity in the legacies of the Doctrine of Discovery, the enslavement of Black people and the mistreatment of all people of color, we hear the prophets and the Spirit speaking clearly when we listen together.

This Advent, we feel called to name the truth that the sin of racism and white supremacy is ongoing. People continue to be subjected to and oppressed by these systemic evils, even within our own churches and the ecumenical movement.

For the sake of our common mission and witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ, we share a commitment to dismantling racism and combating white supremacy, and we actively seek opportunities to engage more deeply. We bind ourselves together in this work, even as we are bound together by a common history of complicity with evil. We look forward to meeting with members from the Black, Indigenous and other communities of color with and beyond our churches to help us develop specific goals and actions. We know this will not be easy, but it is essential. It happens only by moving beyond the borders of the familiar, encountering the truth, trusting God’s

grace and being transformed. We have much to learn from and with each other.

The birth of Christ to dwell among us holds the hope for our own rebirth. Our faith is in God’s ongoing work that establishes God’s kingdom of equity, equality, justice and liberty for all. Our calling is to prepare the way of the Lord by embracing truth, promoting healing and acting in love.

As you make your Advent preparation this year, what do you need most? Forgiveness, repentance, healing, renewal of baptismal vocation, time in the wilderness, or a word from a prophet? We are confident that God will grant us all that we need to be transformed for faithful witness.

Let us pray:

*God of all, form us into churches beyond borders.*

*When we feel stuck, amplify the prophet’s word.*

*When we are distracted by privilege, put us in the wilderness.*

*When we need a new way, dunk us in the river.*

*When we are wrong, move us down the path of truth-telling and repentance.*

*When we need healing, sustain us with your love and hope.*

*When we cannot see beyond ourselves, move us beyond arbitrary borders.*

*Bless us with the Holy Spirit, that the good news may be for us a beginning. Amen.*
