From the Rector

We celebrate the Baptismal feast of All Saints on Sunday, November 4, 2018 at the 9:00am service. We have the opportunity as a community to look to God with a spirit of thankfulness at this season of the year. Thankfulness does not belong to Episcopalians, or even just to Christians. Our parish has an opportunity to gather with our religiously diverse neighbors to give thanks for the beauty of the earth, for our families and our many friends, and for every act and decision that makes our communities healthy and prosperous.

On November 18, from 2 - 4 p.m., congregations from the West County will gather at United Hebrew Congregation to be thankful together. We will sing songs of thankfulness from many traditions. We will bring our favorite vegetarian Thanksgiving side dishes to

share. Additionally, we will pack Thanksgiving food baskets for the Parkway School District Food Bank. The box in the Gathering Space will receive your contribution of macaroni and cheese to fulfill our part of the baskets.

This is also the season when the church turns our eyes toward the coming of the Savior. The nearer we are to Advent the more we look to "last things" in the readings of the lectionary. "*We remember his death. We proclaim his resurrection. We await his coming in glory.*" We rejoice in the seasons of our salvation in our memorial acclamation. Advent combines the solemn and joyful hope of Christ. On December 2, Bishop George Wayne Smith will join us at a single combined service at 10:00 a.m. to be followed by a meal and the Annual Intergenerational Advent Event. A letter from Episcopal Bishop Dorsey McConnell to congregations in Pennsylvania:

October 27, 2018

Dear Friends in Christ,

A short time ago, a gunman entered Tree of Life Synagogue in Squirrel Hill, apparently shouting anti-Jewish slogans and shooting into the crowd of worshippers gathered for the Sabbath. As of this writing, eight people are known dead and others injured.

The newscasts, sickeningly, are referring again and again to this horror as a “tragedy.” It is no such thing. A tragedy is inevitable. This was not. It was murder, murder of a particularly vile and poisonous kind. Human beings have moral agency. Someone chose to hate, and chose to kill. And now we are faced with a choice as well— to do nothing, or to reject this hatred in the strongest possible words and actions, and to refute in every way, in every forum, the philosophical foundations of anti-Semitism wherever they have gained a foothold in our churches and our society.

We are waiting upon the leadership of the Jewish community of Pittsburgh as they consider an appropriate common response in which we also may join to express our grief and support. In the meantime, I ask all the congregations of this diocese to keep the



people of Tree of Life, and their leadership, in our prayers, mentioning them particularly, during the prayers of the people in tomorrow’s liturgies, and including a time of silence in commemoration of their dead under the biddings for the departed.

This terror is added to the great heap of such crimes we have witnessed in the past. Yet our hope is not dimmed, and our obligation is clear: “Behold, I set before you this day, life and death, blessing and curse: therefore choose life, that you and your descendants may live.” (Deuteronomy 30:19) May we especially who bear the name of Christ be fierce in our love and unwavering in our courage, as we mourn with those who mourn, and work with others to lay the foundations for blessing, life and peace for all people.

Aretha Franklin Died Without a Will. What About You?

It seems unbelievable, but news reports confirm that despite her substantial wealth and wise ways, Aretha Franklin died without a will.

(www.nytimes.com/2018/08/22/arts/music/aretha-franklin-will.html).

It means her four sons will not receive any monies from her estate for years while it is tied up in Michigan probate court. It means that she did not designate a bequest to New Bethel Baptist Church in Detroit, the church founded by her father, which nurtured her singing and was the site of her moving funeral. Despite knowing her death from pancreatic cancer was near, the "Queen of Soul" seems to have been unable to accept her impending death to

provide for her children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews and cousins and designated charities.

What about you? Will you show some R-E-S-P-E-C-T for your loved ones? Have you created plans that assure that your wishes for end-of-life care (*Advanced Directive, including Health Care Proxy*), disposal of your temporal goods (*Power of Attorney for Finances; Revocable Living Trust; Last Will and Testament*) are in place? Our Book of Common Prayer (p. 445) encourages Christians to be thoughtful and prepared for these matters. Have you completed a *Pre-Planning Funeral Form for St. Timothy's Parishioners?* (www.saint-tims.org/funeral-planning.html).

These are ways we can live faithfully, realistically and be good stewards of the worldly gifts with which we have all been blessed. Let Fr. Marvin Foltz or Fr. Paul Metzler know if you'd like to schedule a conversation about these matters.

Text from the statement issued by the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church in response to the Tree of Life Synagogue Shooting:

...On Saturday...A gunman entered the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh. A number of people have been killed and wounded. Our Jewish neighbors, our brothers and sisters, are fearful and we must stand with them and provide comfort and support for them and for all. It is reported that the gunman not only ranted anti-Semitic sayings, he has also ranted and spoken against immigrants and refugees and other peoples.

We must pray, we must pray for him, we must pray for the spirit of our nation, that a spirit of love and compassion and goodness and decency would pervade, and that spirits of hatred and bigotry would be cast away. But, above all, at this time, pray for those who have died and for their families and their loved ones. Pray for those who are wounded. Pray for the first responders, pray for our brothers and sisters in the Jewish community. Pray for the Tree of Life synagogue. Pray for the City of Pittsburgh. Pray for America. Pray for us all.

And then, go out and do something. Do something that helps to end the long night and helps to bring in the daylight. Visit a neighbor. Remind our Jewish brothers and sisters that they do not stand alone. Care for someone. Love. Stand for what is right and good. Then pray. And then act.

God love you. God bless you. And may God hold us all in those almighty hands of love.

who can't make it. And if you have family members who also serve, MSP prevents us from scheduling household members for different services on the same weekend. Now you can share your talents and keep control of your time.
